Introduction to Microeconomics F24 Econ 2010 Jessica Kripalani

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This study of basic economic principles and the structure and functioning of a modern economy serves as an introduction to microeconomics. Economics is the science of choice. This course introduces microeconomic concepts and analysis, supply and demand analysis, theories of the firm and individual behavior, competition and monopoly, and welfare economics.

ECO 2010 studies demand and supply, consumer behavior, the theory of business enterprise, the operation of competitive and monopolistic markets, and the forces determining income distribution. A full introduction to economic principles warrants completion of both ECON 2010 and 2020. Students planning to take both semesters of economic principles are advised to take ECON 2010 first, though this is not required. The department recommends ECON 2010 to students intending to take only one semester of principles.

There are no prerequisites for ECO 2010.

COURSE LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Upon successful completion of this course, you will be able to:

- Describe the concepts of scarcity, choice, and opportunity cost, and explain how society decides what, how, and for whom to produce.
- Describe the impact of government policies on market outcomes and the equity/efficiency tradeoff.
- Describe cost/benefit analysis, decision-making at the margin, optimization, and the relationship between marginalism and calculus.
- Describe buyer behavior, rationality, and the utility-maximizing consumer, and demand elasticity.
